HUMA 5770 Field Research: Theory and Practice

Descriptions:

In this course we explore theories, methods, and techniques in ethnographic field research. The current discussions on writing ethnography and textural representation are also covered in the course. Students are required to start their field research projects at the beginning of semester. The experiences and problems of students' fieldwork will be examined in the seminar.

Learning outcomes after completion of the course:

- Understand the anthropological approach of conducting field research.
- Understand the advantages and limitations of the anthropological field research method.
- Acquire a holistic perspective in conducting field research.
- Master the basic field research techniques.

- All course participants need to submit <u>a one-page reading response paper</u> on the required readings of each week <u>before</u> the class through email to the course instructor.
- All course participants need to exercise doing field work and **to submit the field notes each** week.
