Course description

This course gives students fundamental knowledge of the masterpieces of Western architecture and the variation in styles in different epochs and cultures, from ancient Greece to the 21st century.

Intended Learning Outcomes

Students taking this course will

- a) acquire a general understanding of the basic terminology of the subject
- b) know the chronology and typology of Western architecture from ancient Greece to the 21st century
- c) be able to identify the stylistic characteristics of different epochs in different European countries and relate them to structural/tectonic systems, architectural theories and socio-economic and cultural conditions of their emergence

A book talk by renowned architect **Raymond Fung** will take place in the library on **Oct 26 (Thu)** and participation is obligatory. Raymond Fung will also host a guided tour to the Wetland Park on **Nov 4 (Sat)** and participation is voluntary.
