Intended learning outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students will

1. have a basic knowledge of the scope, diversity and forms of Western art;
2. have analytical and expressive skills to engage with a wide range of artworks and art practices;
3. be able to apply the taught concepts and analytical skills to the appreciation of artworks in both oral and written format.

Assessment of students' performance

1. Attendance (10%)
 - checked randomly after the add/drop period, 1% will be deducted for each absence
2. Mid-term Quiz (25%)
 - MC questions, True/False questions, Fill-in-the-blanks, short questions
3. Final Exam (40%)
 - MC questions, True/False questions, Fill-in-the-blanks, short questions, essay writing
4. Group Presentation (25%)
 - this part will be assessed individually

Group research and presentation project

Students have to form groups of 3 to 4 members (depending on the final number of enrollments). Each group has to choose a **contemporary artwork found in Hong Kong**, which is created with a **Western art medium**, and do an **in-class/video (or mixed) presentation of 15 minutes**. It can be a **painting**, a **sculpture** or an **installation** presented in a gallery, a museum, an artist's studio or any public space. Students are expected to apply the methodology of art appreciation to analyze the chosen artwork. Students will be asked to rate peer presentations and give feedback during the presentation sessions.
