# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Through a progressive series of composition projects, students learn the organizational skill of musical composition and performances, focusing on the basics of unity and variety; promoting students' understanding of humanistic experiences, creativities and emotions. Weekly listening, reading, and composition assignments draw on a broad range of musical styles and intellectual traditions, from various cultures and historical periods. Advice on the background of Students: Students are required to have the ability to sing or to play one or more musical instruments (e.g. Grade 3 in Royal Schools Music Exam or equivalent).

The ability to read music and the knowledge to music notation are preferable, but not required.

# INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. developed your overall creative thinking;
- 2. gained the ability to express yourself through writing music;
- 3. a deeper appreciation and understanding of music, regardless of style;
- 4. stronger musicianship skills; and a wider and practical understanding of music theory

# **INTIMACY OF CREATIVITY 2019**

HKUST's annual, internationally-acclaimed composers and performers festival, the Intimacy of Creativity: The Bright Sheng Partnership: Composers Meet Performers in Hong Kong (<a href="https://www.ic.shss.ust.hk">www.ic.shss.ust.hk</a>), will take place **from 22 April to 5 May, 2019** and serve as centerpiece of the course.

Examples from featured compositions from the 2019 season will be provide the foundation of this course. During the festival, students are asked to attend events in lieu of regular lecture and tutorial meetings and engage in dialogue with Prof. Bright Sheng and featured composers and performers. The complete schedule and registration for events will be provided later in the term.

Students are asked to write a paper about their experience attending events demonstrating use of course concepts to discuss works, composers, and/or performers presented. Further guidelines, thesis-writing and other writing skills will be discussed in class. A grading rubric for the assignment can be found below.

Reports are to be handed in by 5pm on 10 May, 2019 to CYT G005. Hard copies with name and student ID clearly marked will only be accepted.

## **MID-TERM PROJECT**

Students will be asked to compose and present an in-class performance of a new composition for 1-2 performers with a duration of 1-2 minutes. The project should demonstrate creative application of course concepts and professional-level presentation of their new composition. Compositions MUST HAVE BEEN COMPOSED DURING THE TIME OF TAKING THE COURSE.

Students will be expected to treat this project assignment AS IF HAVING BEEN COMMISSIONED BY A PROFESSIONAL ENSEMBLE, with clearly-prepared performance materials, and necessary rehearsal time following the schedule outlined below. Further logistics will be discussed in class.

# **FINAL PROJECT**

Students are asked to compose and present at the Spring 2019 HUMA Music Course Showcase a new composition for at least 2 performers with a duration of at least 3 minutes. The work should demonstrate creative application of course concepts on a larger scale and professional-level presentation of their new composition.

This work may be build on their mid-term project or be a new composition. Compositions MUST HAVE BEEN COMPOSED DURING THE TIME OF TAKING THE COURSE.

Students will be expected to treat this project assignment AS IF HAVING BEEN COMMISSIONED BY A PROFESSIONAL ENSEMBLE, with clearly-prepared performance materials, and necessary rehearsal time following the schedule outlined below. Assistance will be provided in securing available performers for larger works. Further logistics will be discussed in class.

There will be no formal final exam.

## **QUIZZES**

Two quizzes will be held in lecture session as outlined below covering basic course concepts to demonstrate comprehension of those topics covered in discussion.

## **ASSIGNMENTS**

Students will be given regular assignments to assess understanding of core concepts to be applied in mid-term and final projects.

Exercises will include preparing a program note for your Final Project.

## **ATTENDANCE**

Lecture and tutorial attendance will be taken **ten (10) times** each at lecture and tutorial sessions randomly throughout the semester after the add/drop period (each time at a different point during a given class meeting) and at all IC2019 events. For each additional absence, students will have 1% deducted from their attendance grade (10% maximum deduction).
