Course Description

This course aims at bringing to students a broadened understanding of drawing through taking a fresh and experimental approach to the study of various media. Students are guided through a discovery journey of drawing to learn how to "read" drawings, how lines and space are organized, what visual effects or concepts are communicated, and to develop a creative approach in problem solving. They will experiment with line, tone, texture, scale and composition, and work with different media and tools to approach a broad range of subjects from still life to abstract pattern.

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILO)

Upon completion of this course, students are expected to be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate critical thinking on drawing as an art form through art work critique, presentation and exhibition
- 2. Use creative and experimental skills on drawing and mark-making as a medium of expression and communication
- 3. Describe the history, concepts and theories of experimental drawing
- 4. Appreciate the experimental drawings of various artists in modern China and 20th century western art

Requirements

- Timely completion of assignments and thematic works;
- Participation in group and individual critiques;
- Attendance and being on-time for each lesson.
- Please note that students will have to pay for their own materials fee involved in the creation by themselves. Estimate cost will be around HK\$250

Attendance (10%) & Course Participation (10%)	 Students are expected to attend classes and participate in discussions and critiques. Attendance and participation are required because they allow a forum for the development of art making and critical skills. Attendance will be taken 10 minutes after the beginning of each session. For each absence, students will have 1% deducted from their attendance grade. Maximum deduction – 10%. 	N/A
3 Drawing Assignments (20% each)	 3 works (Topic: Nature, Self-portrait and Time) will be assessed. Part of the works will be done during class. The 3 assignments shows the students' visual expression capability, creativity, approach to materials and presentation skills. 10% of mark will be deducted per day in case of late submission. No assignment will be accepted after a week of the submission deadline. 	1/2/3/4
Final Exhibition (20%)	 Each student chooses their best works to be exhibited at the end of the course. A 500-word artist statement is required to let the audience know more about the background and creative ideas behind the artwork. Students should finish setting up their works on or before the deadline announced and keep the works in good condition during the whole exhibition period. No late submission is accepted. 	1/2/3/4
