HUMA5516: Research Methods and Sources in Qing History

The course aims to familiarize students with the types of sources available for research from the late imperial period. They should become able to navigate through the different forms of these documents and find useful ones for their research purpose. They will also gain the ability to read through these documents with some level of comprehension, understanding their form, their creation, and their content. Students will be asked to come up with a research proposal for a topic of their choice, highlighting the type of documents that they may use and the scope of the project. Over the course of the semester students will also be translating sections of documents I select, both as a way to work on their translation skills, as well as to have them become more familiar with the types of documents at hand.

Students taking this course should be able to read classical Chinese.

Participation:

Every week there will be mandatory assigned sources that students are expected to not only read, but to translate into English. The documents are short in nature. During class we will go through the document assigned line by line in a translation exercise, and in the process discuss difficulties in reading the document and also the meaning of the source, etc. Students need to come to class and be prepared to provide translation for the document on the spot. Grades for this portion is counted under class participation and the student's quality of contribution is the main deciding factor in grade given.

If you are a RPG student, I would like to feature something that you are using right now for your own research project in the course for the whole class to go through together – I think it will be a useful, and hopefully helpful, exercise. Contact me with a copy of the document and which week you think it could fit in. (Later weeks' readings will be filled in as we arrange them based on individual students' research interests)

Research Paper:

Students will be asked to write a research paper on an original topic of his/her choosing that utilizes Qing dynasty sources. The topic will be chosen in consultation with the professor. It should be a piece of original research conceived and conducted by the student that makes an academic argument. The paper should be between 6000-9000 words and adhere to standard citation practices and journal article formatting using Chicago style citations.

For the final week of the semester students are expected to present their research to the rest of the class. Details to follow.

Assignments are due at the beginning of class of the days when they are due, and anything submitted subsequent to the due time is considered late. For each day of lateness, one third of a letter grade will be deducted from the assignment's grade, including weekends.
