Appreciation of Western Art

Course Description

The course is an introduction to the appreciation of art through selected works of painting and sculpture from the West, from ancient periods to the present. Students will learn to use different approaches to understand the language of art and the complexity of artistic creation in Western culture.

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- ILO1. describe the scope, diversity of themes and subject matter, central issues, major forms and styles of Western art at a fundamental level;
- ILO2. demonstrate an understanding of the language of art and through it a wide range of artworks and art practices;
- ILO3. apply the methodology of art appreciation to describe, discuss and analyze artworks in both oral and written formats.

Museum/Gallery Visit

One or more guided museum/gallery visits will be arranged during the term. Participation is strongly recommended.

Besides, students must make a museum/gallery visit in person with their presentation group members to select their presentation topic.

Assessed Task	Mapped ILOs	Explanation
Mid-Term Quiz	ILO1, ILO2	This task assesses students' understanding of the language of art (ILO2), materials and techniques, and art genres in Western art (ILO1, ILO2).
Group Project & Presentation	ILO2, ILO3	This task assesses students' ability to apply the methodology of appreciation of art to a topic selected by themselves (ILO2, ILO3). It will also check their ability to work in a group to research and generate presentation material on the chosen topic and to present their work in class (ILO3).
Final Examination	ILO1, ILO2, ILO3	This task assesses students' understanding of art styles and the special topics taught in the course (ILO1, ILO2). The essay question will check their ability to discuss art critically and analytically (ILO3).
Attendance & Comments on Presentations	ILO1, ILO2, ILO3	Attendance is checked to ensure students' in-class participation in which open discussion will be conducted from time to time (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3).
