**Course description**

This course explores the Cantonese language, emphasizing its role as a vital lingua franca in Hong Kong. Students will gain a comprehensive understanding of Cantonese grammar, including its sound system, word formation, and sentence structure. The course also examines the challenges posed by Cantonese's unique features, such as its tones, sentence structures, and the frequent lack of direct English and even Mandarin counterparts for many grammatical categories. Additionally, this course offers an introduction to the historical background and sociolinguistic context of Cantonese. By the end of the course, students will have developed a solid foundation in Cantonese grammar, enabling them to better appreciate its intricacies and to further their understanding of the multifaceted aspects of this important language.

N.B. This is not a language enhancement course. Students are expected to have native (or near-native) proficiency in Cantonese.

**Intended learning outcomes**

- Develop an understanding of the sociohistorical context of Cantonese, including its historical background, social status, and the ongoing processes of language variation and change
- Identify and analyse the unique features of the Cantonese sound system, including its tones, consonants, and vowels
- Demonstrate an understanding of the core components of Cantonese grammar, such as word formation, sentence structure, and the use of classifiers
