Course Title: Music of China

Course Description: This course will look at various forms of Chinese music, focusing in particular on instrumental genres. Although the aim is not to present the history of Chinese music per se, the topical organization of the course will follow a more or less chronological framework as attention is drawn to certain issues and prominent characteristics of music and musical life in China from ancient times to the present. The ability to read music or knowledge of musical notation would be helpful, but not required.

Week	Topics	Briefly outline what this topic will cover
1	The Chinese Music System	Music's relationship to numerology, weights and measures, acoustical computations, ethics, rites and ceremonies, etc. in early China; the pentatonic framework of Chinese music.
2	Chinese Music Aesthetics	The function of music and what is considered "beautiful" or "good" music in China since ancient times and the persistence of these notions through the present.
3	Music of the Literati, Part 1	The music of the <i>qin</i> zither – the influence of Taoism; the amateur ideal; the <i>qin</i> tablature notation; the mechanics of <i>qin</i> performance.
4	Music of the Literati, Part 2	The Art of Kunqu Opera – historical development; Kun tunes, the reform of Kunqu and its accompanying instrumental ensemble; The Peony Pavilion
5	Music of the People, Part 1a	Sizhu Musics of South China: Jiangnan sizhu
6	Music of the People, Part 1b	Sizhu Musics of South China: Chaozhou xianshi and Kejia hanyue
7	Music of the People, Part 1c	Sizhu Music of South China: Fujian nanyin and Guangdong yinyue

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8	Music of the People, Part 2a	Guchui/Chuida Music: Sunan chuida and Henan shengguan music
9	Music of the People, Part 2b	Luogu Music: Chaozhou daluogu and Jiangnan shifan luogu
10	"National" Music/ Guoyue/ Minyue, Part 1	Solo music for the guzheng, erhu, dizi and pipa
11	"National" Music/ <i>Guoyue/ Minyue,</i> Part 2	Music for the Modern Chinese Orchestra and Modern Chinese Ensembles (e.g. <i>xin Jiangnan sizhu</i>)
12	Music as a Function of Politics	Revolutionary songs of the 1930s, Mao's "Talks at the Yan'an Forum on Art & Literature", Social Realism in Music, the Model Operas and "The Yellow River" Cantata and Piano Concerto
13	Chinese Popular Music	Gangtai yinyue (Cantopop and Mandopop) & Mainland Chinese pop, rock and rap music – trends and trajectories
