Understanding Western Painting

Course Description

This course gives students fundamental knowledge of the masterpieces of Western painting through an outline of chronology, painting genres, painting techniques and styles from ancient Greece to the 20th century.

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- ILO1. have a general understanding of the basic terminology of Western painting;
- ILO2. know the chronology, painting genres, painting techniques, material components and the most representative works of Western painting from ancient Greece to the 20th century;
- ILO3. identify the stylistic characteristics of different epochs and examine them in relation to aesthetic theories, historical circumstances and socio-economic and cultural conditions of their emergence;
- ILO4. have personal contact with artworks through a visit to a local museum.

Field Trip/Museum Visit

A visit to the exhibition "The Hong Kong Jockey Club Series: Cézanne and Renoir Looking at the World — Masterpieces from the Musée de l'Orangerie and the Musée d'Orsay" in the Hong Kong Museum of Art will be arranged. Participation is compulsory. Details will be announced.
