Course Objectives

This course aims to provide students with an interdisciplinary understanding of the cultural diversity in mainland Myanmar, Thailand, Laos and Cambodia. We will examine the complex historical development of majority/minority relations and the formulation of cultural identities among different peoples on this borderland. The dynamic relations among religion, ethnicity, tourism and modernity will be discussed in the context of the region's specific political geography.

Intended Learning Outcomes

On completion of this course, students should be able to

- Comprehend dynamic relations of ethnic identities and political geography in mainland Southeast Asia.
- Develop an interdisciplinary perspective on cultural diversity and a macroscopic focus on the course of state formation.
- Develop a critical understanding of concepts of state and identity in our contemporary social life.

Teaching Approach

In this course, we shall emphasize the various cultural influences from India, China and Europe on this crossroad borderland. We shall address how indigenous peoples maintained their dynamic social and cultural strategies in the last several centuries, and the cultural consequences of the transformation to a modern nation-state system that they have been facing. In tutorials, we will examine various case studies through documentary screenings. Student participation in tutorials are emphasized to accelerate their intellectual development.

Assessment

All students are expected to attend lectures and tutorials. Continual assessment accounts for 50% of the marks. Of this 50%, 30% is based on one term paper (10-15 pages) and the other 20% comes from participation and two review essays on documentaries. The final exam accounts for the remaining 50%.
