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Course Description:

Most of us have a special interest in what will happen to ourselves. If you learn that someone will win a one-million lottery tomorrow, you feel happy for them. If you are then told that the someone is you, a new set of emotions arises. What am I?

The course discusses the possibility of life after death, the existence of a soul, the possibility and desirability of immortality, abortion, and euthanasia. These discussions greatly affect how one chooses one's religion and perceives the value of life. We will read classical and contemporary theories of the self, personal identity, afterlife, death, and will explore the relation between the self and its environment, the basis of (non)egoistic future concerns and responsibilities. By looking at different approaches and various (Eastern and Western) philosophical and religious traditions to answering fundamental questions, we learn to develop the habit of thinking in a critical way.

Course Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs):

Students will learn to:

- Develop a cross-cultural understanding of issues about the self in the history of philosophy
- Critically examine issues surrounding the relationships between what we are and our persistence conditions
- Enhance close reading and analytical thinking skills
- Develop the ability to formulate arguments in the format of an academic essay
- Develop skills of self-identification, judge current situation and evaluate the responsibilities of oneself
- Analyze life meaning and plan for the future and investigate beliefs about afterlife

Course Requirements (100 marks in total)

- Midterm exam: 20 marks
- Final exam: 40 marks
- One written assignment (max. 1,000 words): 20 marks
- One presentation: 10 marks
- Course participation: 10 marks

Midterm Exam:

It is an in-class midterm exam with a duration of 1.5 hours.

Students are required to answer short and long questions that test understanding and their ideas.

Final Exam:

The final examination will last for 3 hours.

Students are required to answer short and long questions that test understanding and their ideas.

Written assignment:

Students are expected to write an essay of max. 1,000 words.

It should be a commentary on the teaching materials in the form of a thoughtful critique or interpretation of the readings.

Presentation:

Students can select any topics about personal identity or self to give a short presentation.

Course participation:

Students' participation in class will be evaluated based on how well you are prepared for each session and the quality and frequency of your contributions. Students are expected to participate actively in class and the tutorials.

There will be short debates in class on controversial issues on the self. Students with different positions are invited to speak aloud and provide justifications for their thoughts. Students are encouraged to help each other in formulating arguments and replying to opponents.
